WHY ARE GIRAFFE'S NECK AND LEGS LONG?

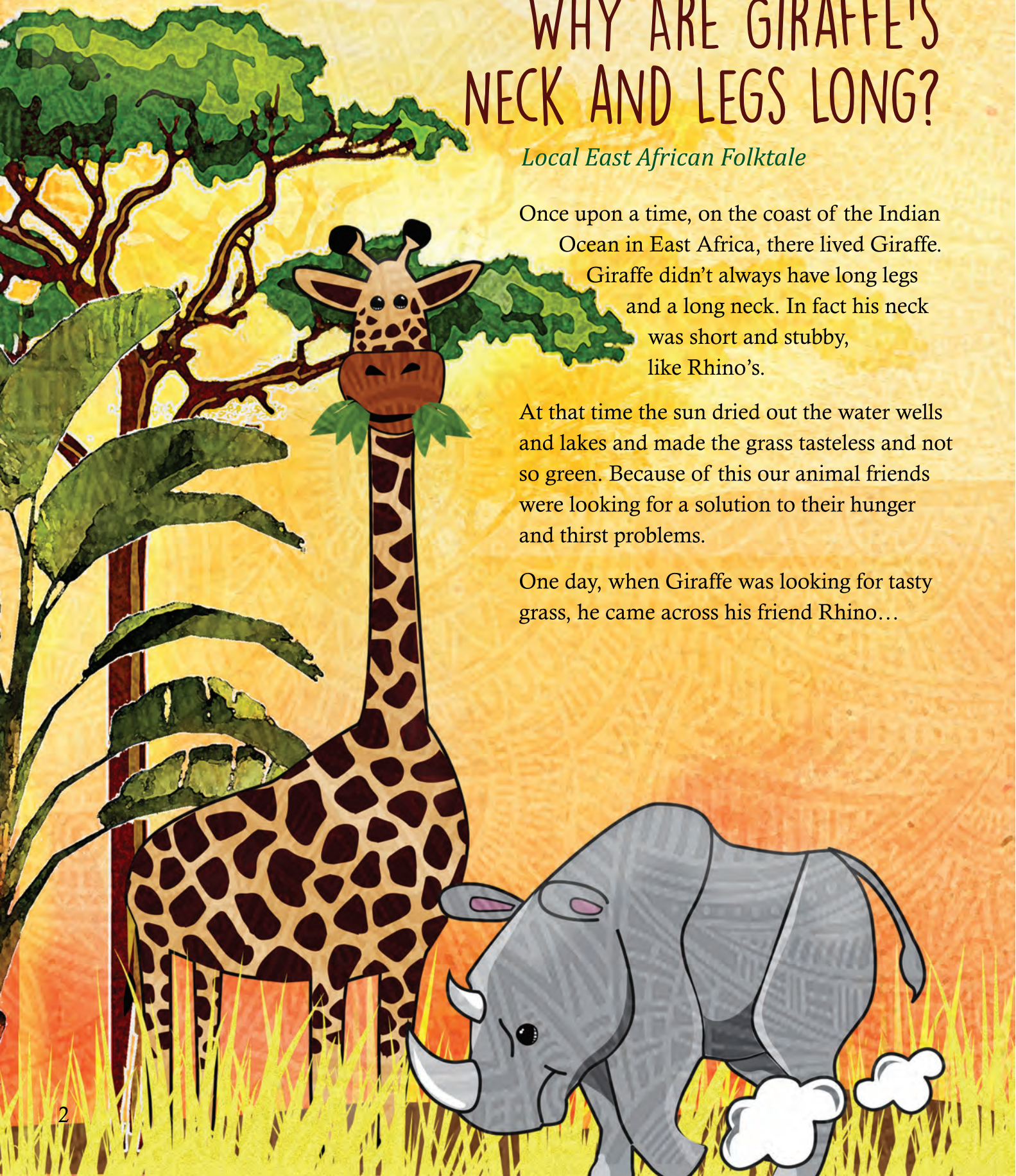
Local East African Folktale

INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT GIRAFFE

(*Giraffa Camelopardalis*)

- Giraffes are the world's tallest mammals.
- They can't lie down because of their height, so they sleep standing for a maximum of two hours a day.
- They have horns; male giraffe's horns are longer than females because male giraffes use them for protecting their families.
- Male giraffes can reach up to 16 feet, and females about 15 feet.
- They're herbivorous and generally eat leaves that other herbivores can't reach.
- They drink water every 5 days but can live without water for longer periods of time.
- They clean their nose, ears and eyes with their tongue which is almost 18 to 20 inches long.
- Thanks to their black, rough, sticky tongue they can eat even the thorns of the Acacia tree, one of the iconic symbols of Africa.
- They travel in small herds. Male giraffes leave their mothers and join single male friends when they are 3 years old.
- Their pregnancy lasts about 14-15 months. They give birth to one baby at a time. Mother giraffes breastfeed their babies for a year.
